EAA ULTRALIGHT HALL OF FAME RECIPIENT

Larry Mauro of Mulberry, Florida, was not a pilot when he pitched in five dollars to buy an Icarus II glider in 1972 after seeing one in an issue of National Geographic magazine.

He soon was hooked on flying, though, and shortly thereafter started the Ultralight Flying Machine Company. Mauro designed several popular ultralight aircraft, then known as hang gliders, including the Demoiselle, Solar Riser, and the Easy Riser.

Demand for the Easy Riser increased significantly after it appeared at the EAA Oshkosh Fly-in in 1976.
